Course Introduction

This course is an introduction to human geography dealing with spatial organization of human activities on the earth's surface. In this course, we will be studying concepts of place, space, migration, population, settlement forms, land utilization and human-environment relations. This course provides you an understanding of Earth's physical and human systems and the interdependence between them. Additionally, this course attempts to expand your geographical imagination and help you to understand why geography and place matters. We will treat this course as an overview of human geography as a subject, covering a number of different topics.

Exams

Each exam will be of 60 points. Questions will be in the form of fill-in-the-blank, true/false, multiple choice, map quiz, and short answer type questions. Make up exams will be given only in the case of excused absences. You should provide a document (e.g. a request to excuse

your absence from your team coach, a doctor's note, a note from a physician's assistant, counselor, or nurse) explaining why you missed the exam.

In-Class Exercises/Quizzes/Short Writing Assignments

Through the quarter, there will be some in-class activities in the form of exercises and quizzes. These in-class activities will provide you an opportunity to apply your knowledge in relation to the recent lectures and textbook.

In-class exercises and quizzes will be worth of 5 to 15 pts. If you miss the class on the day of in-class activities and if you cannot provide any documentation, you will receive a zero for that specific in-class activity. However, in case of excused absence, you will be given an opportunity to make-up the missed activity.

Writing Assignment:

You will write one essay during the quarter. More details about the essay and grading criteria will be provided later on the Canvas.

Topic #1

Write an original essay on global warming and climate change. Your essay must identify one source region of greenhouse gas emission and one impact region and explain how the impact region is affected by the source region. For example, countries like China, USA, European Union, and India are sources of huge amount of greenhouse gases. In 2012, the largest contributors of greenhouse gases were China (27%) followed by the USA (14%) and European Union (10%). The production of greenhouse gases in these source countries affects the economically less developed countries like Bangladesh, which is more likely vulnerable to global climate change and sea level rise. You can focus on China and examine how the rapid economic development, increased energy use, and meat consumption in China are contributing to the global warming and climate change which in turn affect the people living in coastal areas of Bangladesh.

Topic #2

Write an original essay on population policy/migration policy/urban policy. Your essay must compare population policies between two countries and discuss how these policies will impact future development of these countries. For example, you could compare and contrast between population policies of India and China. India's population policy targeted female sterilization whereas China adopted a draconian one-child policy in 1979. How these population policies affected women in these two countries? Did it reduce gender inequality in any way? How did one-child policy affect sex-ratio in China? At the current rate of population growth, India will take over China in 2020 and will become the most populous country in the world. By 2020, India will also become one of the youthful countries in the world. On the contrary, China will have to deal with an aging population in the coming decades. How would that affect the future socioeconomic development of these two countries?

You could also contrast countries with different migration policies (e.g., Japan versus Canada), different urbanization policies (e.g., both Myanmar and Nigeria have moved their capitals within the past quarter century but for different reasons), or even different policies towards the role of women in society.

The writing assignment should be completed in two steps. First, you should write a draft of your essay on which I will provide comments. The draft should be at least 2-3 pages long. You should cite at least five sources for your essay. One source could be your text book. The other sources could be books, journal articles, newspaper articles, media, and internet. Please do not cite Wikipedia or similar sources such as content from Ask.com. Your final essay should be 4-5 pages long. Please use Times New Roman, 11-point font, 1 inch margin and double space for your essay.

5 points will be deducted per weekday for late assignments. So, turn in your assignments ontime!

AVOID plagiarism! If you have any doubts how to cite sources, please ask me.

Required Film Review: (10 points)

You will watch a film on Bolivia's water conflict and write a review. The details of this assignment will be posted later on Canvas. Please bring a hard copy to the class on April 27 and upload the soft copy on the Canvas by the midnight of the due date.

Optional Extra Credit: (10 points)

Close to half of the 7000 languages spoken on Earth are under threat of disappearance. Write about a language that is under threat, and the reasons it is disappearing, including economic and geographic factors affecting its speakers. What language(s) is/are replacing this language and why? What efforts are being made to rescue this language?

The word limit for this assignment is 1000. <u>An assignment less than 500 words is unaccepted.</u> You should use Times New Roman, 12 font, and 1 inch margin. The grading criteria or the rubric will be provided later on the Canvas. **Please bring a hard copy to the class on June 4 and upload the soft copy on the Canvas by the midnight of the due date.**

Attendance Policy

Students are expected to attend class on a regular basis.

Circumstance 2:

documentation. With this documentation, your absence will be excused and you will be given the opportunity to make up in-class exercises, quizzes, and exams that occurred during your absence and turn in the assignments that were due during your absence.

They should reflect a general outline of the material covered, with emphasis on major interpretations and important points.
